Grant Recipient Highlights

The **Troy - Tutwiler Prison Garden Program** was formed in 2019 in Montgomery, Alabama, after Dr. Sharon Everhardt and Dr. Stephen Carmody. The courses teach inmates about the fundamentals of gardening, horticulture, and nutrition while giving them hands-on experience with growing a garden in their Garden of Perseverance. "We talk a lot about the amount of vegetables we grow, but I think what we're really doing is growing something bigger than that," Carmody said. "We're growing hope, self-reliance, respect, and resilience along with our tomatoes, pumpkins, and broccoli. When you look at the garden, I want people to see the dedication and commitment these women have made to a better life."





The mission of the **Tuscaloosa Education Foundation** is to provide support and financial resources to enhance public education through a partnership with local school systems. They provide innovative programs and services through a collaborative and community effort to enhance literacy throughout Tuscaloosa and beyond. They also support programs and funding that will empower schools, teachers, administrators, and students to build character and key life skills that will set them up for success.

Elephants Alive is based out of The Great Limpopo Transfrontier Area in South Africa. Their mission is to ensure the survival of elephants and their habitats, and to promote the harmonious co-existence of elephants and people. "We believe through education and collaboration, we share what we have learnt about elephants and the critical role they play in ensuring a healthy ecosystem." They ensure the survival of elephants using science-based solutions. They have developed an identification database consisting of over 2,000 elephants by documenting their unique features. This ongoing long-term study, which began 25 years ago, helps them understand social bonds between elephants, and helps estimate population size based on the proportion of known individuals recorded over time.






Westminster Home Connection, based out of Nashville, Tennessee, is a home construction nonprofit that serves older adults and people with disabilities whose homes have become unsafe places to live due to issues of function or mobility. Their low-cost improvements give homeowners a way to remain in the home they love and in the communities where they've built their lives. Serving Middle Tennesseans in seven counties, our construction teams resolve safety, mobility, and functionality issues, including step-in bathtubs, wheelchair ramps, electrical issues, and leaky pipes, that might otherwise cause homeowners to be forced to leave their homes.
